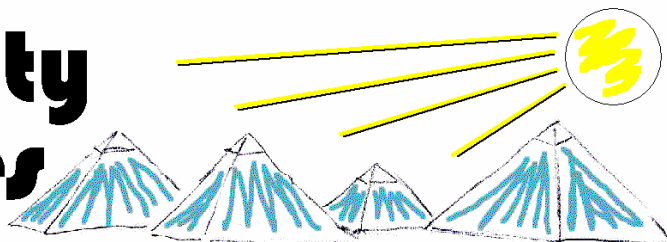

#### GAME SHOW!!!

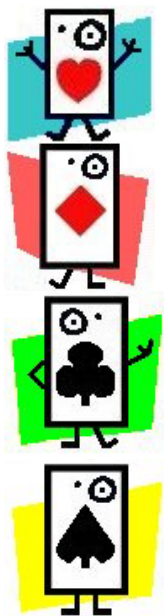

## DEAR VINNIES

Are there any general rules about when you should, or should not, open (or overcall) the bidding with a game pre-empt, or is this something where common sense and intuition kick in? The other night at the club, I opened "5 clubs" in second seat (not vul opposite vul) with AKQxxxxx and nothing else, except 3 hearts to the J. As it turned out, partner had 5 made, whereas 5 clubs went down. (Opponents can't really make anything.) Did I do something wrong, or was this just unlucky?

### Wanting to do the right thing

#### Dear Wanting

In 2<sup>nd</sup> seat, pre-empts should be disciplined, because you know that RHO has less than an opener. With the hand you had, 4 clubs would be sufficient; gambling 3NT is another possibility, if you play that convention. In general, opening 5 of a minor is a real crap shoot. Often the opponents will double and leave it in when they would not or could not bid a game. Other times, they bid a slam which they would not bid if they had more room. Before

opening 5 of a minor, ask yourself: "Do I feel lucky?"

Remember that pre-empts will not work all the time. Sometimes the opponents get to the right contract anyway. Sometimes you get to the wrong contract. You are trying to swing the odds in your favor, not bat a thousand. Don't let one bad result discourage you from pre-empting. One of the Vinnies has had more bad results than his partner can stand, but he is still at it.

Rather it is a Life Master earned by getting down there in the trenches doing what most of us do game after game. Life Master earned, no matter how, is an achievement to be recognized. Congratulations Lynn. Well done.



## STAN CABAY



Stan says he was born in Sabourin's General Store in Ardmore, Alberta. He is married to Lisa and is Professor Emeritus of the Department of Computing Science at the University of Alberta. He has a

B.Sc. in Mathematics and a Ph.D. in Computer Science. His main hobby is bridge, but he also dabbles in the stock market, plays Blackjack and does research in Computational Mathematics.

Stan has lived in Edmonton for his entire bridge career. He says, "After completing my Ph.D. degree, I read numerous books on chess and bridge. I chose bridge as a hobby over chess because of the diversity of challenges and because of its social aspects." Stan was one of the original thinkers in bidding theory. Two-way NMF, which most experts play today, was originally conceived and written up by Stan over 3 decades ago. Stan has convinced me of the futility of "up the line bidding" and says that all NT balanced hands should be described by an NT rebid, thereby possibly suppressing a 4-card major (which can be bid later). Bridge is a serious hobby for Stan, but he finds it fun. Probably the all-time fun team (jokes, wisecracks and general bridge chaos) that Edmonton has ever witnessed was the team of Stan Cabay, Lisa Lister, George Kelly, Allan Terplawy and Ron Gardiner. A sense of humour was a prerequisite to play on that team. They all played very good bridge as well, representing our zone in the CNTC several times. In addition, Stan and George represented District 18 in the Grand National Pairs (now the NAOP) at its debut in 1978. They were there in the three subsequent years, once finishing in the high overalls (4th or 5th) at the national final.

Stan describes his bridge philosophy: "Bridge is a partnership game. Partnership understandings in bidding and defence, and partnership practice, are the most important elements for successful bridge. These understandings include compromising accuracy in bidding in order to interfere with the opponents' communications. You won't

win often if you give the opponents free reign."

Stan relates a couple of anecdotes from his bridge experiences: "Playing with Hans Groenig in a Lloydminster sectional, we crisply Q-bid to a 6S contract, which was loudly doubled. Holding xxxxx in spades, I pulled in fright to 6NT, which was also promptly doubled. Would you believe that even though partner held only xxx in spades, 6NT was unbeatable. LHO (the doubler) held KQJT in spades, RHO held the stiff A, and we had an easy 12 tricks outside of spades!

Playing with George Kelly in the district finals of the Grand National Pairs in Great Falls, George pre-empted with 3H in the auction 1S-3H-4H-P-4S-P-5H. The 1S opener had a heart void, and after the 2nd heart call from his partner, opener concluded that George's 3H bid must be a psyche. Oops! His partner also had a heart void. I have to give credit to RHO who shivered only slightly when dummy came down, but then quietly conceded ten tricks, with a hand that was cold for 7S."

Stan's first regional tournament was in Edmonton around 1974. "Paul Rushton and I were thrilled to be 3rd after the 2nd session (maybe it was after the 3rd) in the 4-session open pairs, playing 'Precision With Asking Bids from Alpha to Zeta'. However, we were derailed by a few psyches in the final session. Gary Hayden won the event and a prize of a large silver bowl. Times have changed." Stan goes on to say, "Many years ago, I was a pretty heavy smoker. On one occasion, having exhausted my supply, I asked my opponent for one. This request was flatly denied. I was quite taken aback, and somewhat hurt, as I considered this opponent a good friend who had often bummed a cigarette from me. His reasoning was that at a prior party my partner had declined the same request from my opponent. So, choose your partners well because, like a spouse, you and a regular partner shall be deemed to be one and the same."

Stan offers this advice to anyone beginning to learn the game: "Become a great declarer by reading; this does not require a partner. Then work on bidding and defense (being a good declarer helps here), preferably with partners whose goals and skill levels are close to your own, and who are willing to work as hard as you. If a

regular partner is your spouse, alignment of goals is mandatory.”

On bridge in general and on improving your game, Stan recommends strong enforcement of the zero tolerance policy, relaxing the restriction on conventions, and devising a better skill-rating system. He feels that these measures might encourage younger players to compete. Stan’s pet peeves are the alert procedures and the ACBL masterpoint rating system. Stan’s final words of advice to bridge players are: “It has to be fun”.

## **LISA CABAY**



Lisa was born in Toronto. She is a homemaker and is married to Stan, her favourite partner. She has a Master’s degree in Computer Science, which she says she needs to interpret Stan’s systemic notes for their

bidding system that he writes in mathematical proof format with a few computer algorithms thrown in. Lisa lists her primary hobby as bridge and her secondary “hobby” as her grandchildren.

Lisa says she got started in bridge this way: “I bought something called Autobridge (anyone remember that?) when I came to Edmonton in 1967. Then, a fellow by the name of Bob Jakes took me to my first duplicate game at the Klondike Bridge Club on Jasper near 115 Street.” Lisa says she joined the ACBL around 1971 and became a Life Master in 1976. Lisa recalls, “In the second round of the Blue Ribbon Pairs years ago, partner and I (in our usual accurate style) bid to 7NT missing an ace. After the opening lead (I wasn’t down yet), I proceeded to finesse successfully and then claimed 13 tricks. I remarked to LHO, ‘Thank goodness you didn’t have that ace or you’d have doubled and led it.’ She replied, ‘Oh, but I did’. Go figure!”

Lisa remembers her first regional tournament very well. “I was 5 months pregnant with my second child and decided to go to Vancouver. Getting there was interesting. It was January and the roads were closed due to avalanches and the planes were on strike, so I took the train. A stranger very nicely traded me a bottom bunk for my top bunk (it would have been hard to waddle up to the top bunk in my

condition). After arriving, I played 3 sessions a day, mostly with Dave Power. It was very exciting to get to play against Eric Murray and Sammy Kehela. Nowadays, with bracketed knockouts being the game of choice, players don’t get to play against the greats for a long, long time. Until recently, in some districts a player could request to be put into the top bracket and very often the request was granted. Now, the masterpoints awarded in a bracket are determined by the masterpoints of the players in that bracket. The pros want their maximum possible points, of course; therefore, the directors won’t let players play in a higher bracket any more. Oh well.”

“I remember an out-of-town sectional where Dick McKinney went to the bar for a drink. The bartender would not serve Dick, having been told that Dick was being obnoxious because he was drunk. We all laughed at this (have you ever seen Dick McKinney obnoxious?) and Dick summoned a director to straighten out the apparent misunderstanding. It turned out that the director had pointed out someone else who was not to be served liquor. The problem was, by the time this got sorted out, the bar was out of scotch and Dick didn’t get a drink anyway!”

Lisa remembers this from her early bridge years. “At first, I was self-taught and I played for a couple years before I studied up scoring. One day, I got doubled in 3 hearts. This scared me half to death and I thought I had better at least get rid of the double. Guess how I did that. I bid 4 hearts! Of course, this was doubled, too, amidst great laughter at the table.”

Lisa’s advice to anyone contemplating learning bridge is, “If you want to play the game just for fun, go for it. If you want to improve, it takes lots of work. At the top levels, everyone can declare well and everyone can defend well. The difference is found in bidding. This is why the experts have volumes of notes about their bridge bidding systems.”

“My bridge partnership with Stan works when neither of us provoke the other after a bad result. Any mix-up should not be discussed at the table (both for our sake and for the sake of the opponents who do not want to witness an argument or, at best, a boring discussion which excludes them). Stan and I have worked very hard over the last year or so at avoiding arguments at the



bridge table. My motto at the table (which I do not always live up to, but I try) is to treat my spouse with the respect I give to every other partner; no ridicule is allowed when partner does something stupid! Since Stan rarely makes a mistake, his bridge actions naturally gain my respect and admiration, so I have to bite my tongue very infrequently. Stan's tongue must get a lot more sore than mine!"
