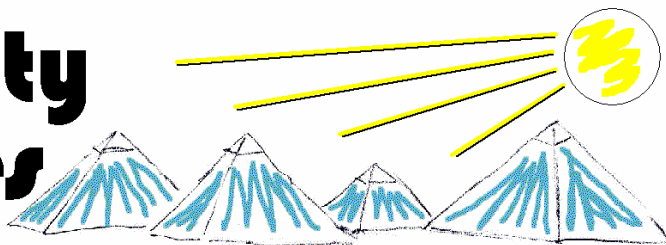

DEAR VINNIES

There is a lot of hullabaloo about hesitations. Of course, there are times when a choice of plays makes it virtually impossible to play in tempo on defense. However, I do think that when signaling attitude, count or suit-preference that in-tempo play should be mandatory. Otherwise, information is transmitted (albeit unintentionally). The simplest example is that a hesitation in defensive play would deny a singleton. I just think that if people choose to play non-standard signals that they should be able to do so without “working it out” at the table. What’s your opinion?

Dear Curious

Playing in tempo is difficult on defense. Given that each defender sees only the dummy and his or her own hand, there are bound to be defensive situations that require more thought than others. When there is an obvious hesitation by a defender, there is an obligation on the partner not to draw any inference from the break in tempo. Similarly, it is inappropriate to play quickly when not signaling, and to play slowly when trying to convey a message to partner.

Planning your defense before playing to the first trick can help one to maintain tempo. Even with this, there will be times when declarer makes an unanticipated play when a break in tempo is unavoidable.

Years ago, when defenders wanted to break tempo without giving away information, they could reach for a cigarette, then search for a light. Those days are long gone. The best we can do these days is “accidentally” spill a glass of water.

If it weren’t for the good sports, this job would be totally boring.

BOB CROSBY



Bob was born in Portage la Prairie, Manitoba. He moved to Edmonton in 1958, and feels that 50 years qualifies him as an Edmontonian. He first played bridge in 1965 as a fill-in for

a game at the Students Union Building at the University of Alberta. He thought he knew how to play bridge, having watched the play the previous day. Not correct! After losing consistently at 1/10 of a cent in these games, he decided he had better do something about it. Consequently, he went to the Edmonton Public Library and, over time, read every book on bridge it had. The next year he was representing the U of A in inter-collegiate bridge matches (par tournaments, as they were called). Bridge was big in those days (1966) and the U of A had 17 tables of duplicate each week. Eventually, he got a B.Sc. in Computing Science. However, he was not yet ready to join the cruel, real world and so he became a bridge pro and made his living by playing rubber bridge and on pro teams. He had a few clients of his own but did not actively



solicit clients. He joined the ACBL in 1967 and became Edmonton's 7th Life Master in 1969 at age 22.

By 1972, Bob had had enough of making his living as a bridge player. For the next 30 years, he worked for the Federal Government as a Systems Software Analyst. Bob semi-retired from tournament bridge during the 1980's and 1990's, as marriage, working, family, etc. seemed to get in the way. He played just rubber bridge and CNTC events for much of that time. Considering retirement from work, he yearned to be a golf bum. He retired and did just that, playing multiple gambling games on the golf course with his golfing buddies. He rejoined tournament bridge in 2002 and began frequenting the bridge club again, partnering with Peter Jones for Thursday night IMP's.

Bob says he has been lucky to have very good partners throughout his bridge career: Dick Grant, Mike Chomyn, Bryan Maksymetz, Vish Viswanathan, Subash Gupta, Peter Jones, and Tom Gandolfo, to mention a few. During the 1970's, Edmonton seemed to dominate the GNT event for our district and zone. Bob was on a team that made the final 8 at Las Vegas and Salt Lake City, and the final 4 in Toronto. "Unfortunately for us," Bob recalls, "we drew teams like Soloway and Goldman, Kantar and Eisenberg; somehow they managed to beat us." In 1980, Bob captained a team that made the semi-finals of the inaugural CNTC event.

Bob says: "My bridge philosophy is that bridge is a partnership game. Invite partner to 'join the party' rather than flying solo and making all the bridge decisions yourself. There is a beauty to a finely tuned partnership that trusts and respects each other. My pet peeve is 'bridge terrorism': solo artists who think the only purpose of bridge is to destroy the opponents' auctions. They open on anything, pre-empt on anything and take partner right out of the picture. I do not mind playing against these types of players, just not with them as a partner or a teammate."

"My first regional tournament I remember quite well as I was disciplined along with my partner, Lee Barton, for having a 25 percent game in a pairs event. Lee and I had not figured out yet that the idea was not to drink an entire bottle of Scotch while playing a regional event. The head director, Phil Wood, was not amused. The event was

played at the McDonald Hotel, if I remember correctly. I also remember the pros complaining that there were 'too many good local players', so they were not cleaning up as much as they wanted to. They offered the theory that it was so cold in Edmonton that the locals had nothing better to do than read bridge books!"

Bob recalls: "During the 1970's, Lee Barton and I won the right to represent Canada in the world Olympiad held in New Orleans. In one of the sessions, we came to a table that was three rows deep with female kibitzers. Lee and I had our Canada badges on. We exchanged glances with them and discovered that the opponents represented Egypt. There was one guy the women seemed to find particularly attractive. His name was Omar Sharif. Lee and I got to a nice spot on the first board, so the mood changed for the opponents. The next board Omar put his partner in 3NT and Lee lead the ♠Q with ♠Kxx hitting the dummy. Declarer played small; I had ♠92 so I played the 9. The queen held the trick and Lee continued the ♠J. Declarer played small again. Lee now cashed his Ace and two more spades for down one in a hand cold for 660. The commotion that came later did not seem like acting, so Lee and I made a hasty retreat. Within earshot of the opponents, Lee said to me (and this is a direct quote): 'Bob, Homer the Sheriff is not so tough'."

Bob continues: "In my retirement, I have rekindled my interest in bidding theory. I have built a web site devoted to discussing bidding theory and have written over 2,000 articles on various bidding subjects. Since I think bidding is the most teachable aspect of bridge, I use these articles as a mentoring tool as well. As people learn at their own rate and moods, this approach works as they can either read the articles or ignore them. I get about 1,000 visitors a week on my site but the sad state of affairs with bridge in North America surfaces. The majority of the visitors are from Europe and other countries throughout the world and virtually none from Alberta or Canada. This is a reflection of what is going on with bridge on this continent. At the last Nationals in Detroit, of the first 25 leaders of the masterpoints at the tournament, most were Europeans. It seems that very few players from Canada want to excel at their hobby. This must be turned around somehow."

Bob's future plan in bridge is to return to playing at a higher level. He says that retirement offers him the time to play more and he misses the top-level competition of years gone by. He enjoys the challenge of competing against the better and best players in the world.

DEAR VINNIES

I have been playing for a couple of years, and I am trying to appreciate the difference in strategy between playing matchpoints and IMPs. So here's a question: In matchpoints, if you have the choice of taking a finesse that will result in either making an overtrick or going down one, is it clear cut that you should forego the finesse and ensure the contract?

The Vinnies seldom have this problem at matchpoints. Usually we are either doubled, or need the finesse to make the contract! Nevertheless, overtricks at matchpoints can be very important. Before risking the contract, you should attempt to evaluate if you are in the normal contract. Trying to figure out what the field will do on the hand is a prerequisite to planning the play. Often it is correct at matchpoints to make an anti-percentage play because the field will be in a different strain, e.g., 3NT rather than 4S.

If you are in the normal contract, then review the play to this point. Are you ahead or behind of the field due to the opening lead, or some earlier play. If so, you need to catch up (take the hook) or maintain your advantage (make your contract). If you have no such clues, take the hook if you think it is more likely to succeed than the normal 50% of the time.

Another consideration is your estimate of how you are scoring in the event. If you need a top, take the hook! If your game has gone well, then making your contract may be good enough.

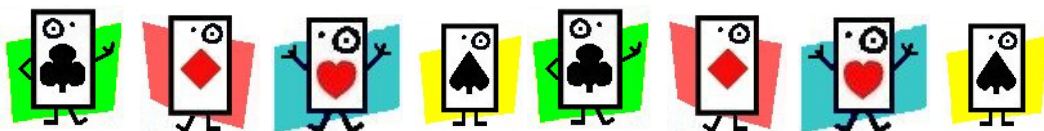
